To all students of the late Cretaceous and early Tertiary formations of the northwest, the Fort Union formation is a familiar term. The name was originally given by Dr. F. V. Hayden3 in 1861 to his great lignite group which: Occupies the whole country around Fort Union, extending north into the British possessions, to unknown distances; also southward to Fort Clark. At the same time it was stated that the formation had also been observed under the White River group on the North Platte River above Fort Laramie, and on the west side of the Wind River...



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
