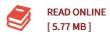

The steel director, in whose charge is the present distribution of pig iron, has repeatedly sounded the extreme need for the strictest conservation of pig iron and the necessity of every foundryman so altering his accustomed practice as to permit of that economy. The pig iron supply of the country is short, considerably so. There is no possible way by which the tonnage lacking can be made up. This stringency and the general labor situation, point to materially reduced production by the foundries as the war goes on. The more liberal use of scrap in mixtures is not likely to offer much permanent relief since the supply of cast and other cupola metal is shrinking and replenishment of stocks...
