Loans to enable investors to purchase bonds in anticipation of income were encouraged, however, provided they were made on a short-term or amortization basis fully repayable within six months. The conditions under which bank loans would be desirable followed the principles set forth in the Joint statement on the matter by national and State bank supervisory authorities on November 23, This statement is found on page A-3 of the Treasury Bulletin for March 1944.
