

Of 45 inches of rain, which fell in the space of 31 Lunar revolutions, I divided 21 94, and found 867 to have fallen with the Sun above the horizon, and 13-27 during his absence. According to this experiment, the Rain by day makes only two thirds of the quantity that falls by night. The greatest rain in twenty-four hours that has fallen under my observation, (or rather that of my assistant, for I was shut up in the packet going to Helvoetsluys,) was on the day and night of the 26th of Sixth Month, 1816. On this occasion, the night in particular was very wet and stormy: the guage at our Laboratory, Stratford, near London, collected205 inches, between 9 a. m. the 26th, and the same hour the following morning. I have already noticed the character of that season, which was at once the coldest and the wettest in twenty years. See Table CXX. and c. of the Observations. In reverting to the column, p. 103, entitled Number of days on which it rained- in each month, the reader will perhaps be struck with the fact, that in our climate, on an average of years, it rains nearly every other day, more or less. He will perceive, however, that the number of days (of twenty-four hours) on which there falls any rain, is less in the longest days than in the shortest, in the proportion of two to three. The...
