William Dodd (born 18 June, 1804) was a man who came to notice when he described his work and growing disability as a child worker. He was employed and sacked by Lord Ashley (eventually the Earl of Shaftesbury) after writing about child workers in the textile industry. He wrote one more book on a related subject that was written and published in America. Dodd was born in 1804 in Kendal and by the age of five he was at work. Dodd said that he came from a family that was well remunerated but that he had fell down the class structure when he started work. Dodd came to notice in 1840 when he published with the support of the social reformer Lord Astley a book which described his own and his sisters experiences as a child worker. He described how they all worked in a textile factory and sometimes they would work for 18 hours per day. Dodd blamed this experience for making him a cripple and by the time he wrote his first book he had had...
